The Kresge Foundation, an independent, private foundation, was created in 1924 by Sebastian S. Kresge to "support organizations whose object is to promote the well-being of mankind." Through our grantmaking programs, we seek to strengthen the capacity of charitable organizations to provide effective programs of quality. Our geographic scope is national and, on occasion, international.

The Foundation's grants support a range of organizations reflecting almost the entire breadth of the nonprofit sector. This diverse group is responding to the new challenges presented by their communities or sustaining activities that have demonstrated their effectiveness. We believe that a challenge grant toward an organization's capital project does more than just build a building or reward good programs. It presents an opportunity to build institutional capacity by helping an organization broaden and deepen its base of support from the private sector and by encouraging volunteer involvement in the fund raising effort and beyond.

As stewards of the Foundation's assets, our Trustees believe that accountability starts with being accessible to those seeking our support. Through our printed materials, telephone contacts, appointments, and regional Information Workshops, we hope to provide sufficient information about our policies and application procedures to prepare an organization to be an informed applicant. Through this dialogue, we also hope to be a more informed grantmaker.

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President's Statement and Year in Review

#### Time To Retire

It is time to retire when:

All clerks in every kind of establishment address you as "Sir."

The Council of Michigan Foundations gives you a souvenir photo from a 1985 event, and you are still wearing the same tie.

The elastic in your over-the-calf socks has lost its grip.

You have trouble reading the numbers from your "Contacts" screen, so the new telephone system cuts you off.

The time has come in your career that all eyes turn to you when you enter a room, but they are looking at your successor, standing next to you.

Your impatience is greater than your importance.

You like doing more than learning and teaching more than doing.

You find you are not following William H. Baldwin's advice to be "warmly objective" in making grants. Too much on the warm side.

You discover that you are the job; the job is you.

I wish to thank my family for their patience, my co-workers for their tremendous dedication and skill, my colleagues for their advice and leadership, my Trustees for allowing a process of continuous improvement, albeit with some interesting bends in the road, my mentors for leading by example and coaching from the bleachers when necessary and the Kresge family for their values of honesty, thrift and lack of pretension which bring us to a better interpretation of donor intent.

In twenty-seven years, I have served under, alongside and over some of the finest professionals one could imagine. We have built a board of high performing people who reflect the diversity we endorse in the nonprofit organizations we fund. Five trustees have led nonprofit organizations which gives us empathy for grantseekers. We have endeavored to be accessible with 500 appointments per year and transparent with grant guidelines and financial reports open to all. Every year we see half the grants go to first-time grantees.

Our book of business covers nearly the entire nonprofit sector, both in this country and abroad. We own a unique franchise which can give grantees, we are told, the "Good Housekeeping Seal." Capital campaigns are our vehicle, but growth of nonprofit capacity is our desired outcome, resulting in better boards, bigger support bases and more visibility for the agencies we fund.

I was amazed to learn that the Foundation has given out \$2.02 billion, 86 percent of total grants since 1924, during the time I have worked here. I am pleased that we have done it with an administrative expense of less than seven percent.

There are those who constantly seek out the new, sometimes at the expense of the old and the effective. There are also those who inject a cult of their own presumed effectiveness and definite personality into their grantmaking. We have stayed in the business of supporting institutions. We have done this by delivering powerful tools to the hands of their leaders so that they can grow their capacity. We have sought neither limelight nor control. And we have sought change not for the sake of change, but for improvement of a grant process that works.

There are those who see foundation governance simply as a matter of control over assets. We have seen it as a covenant between the donor's intent and the public interest.

We have understood our duty as fiduciaries to include treating the Foundation itself as an institution. It is the legacy of a spirit of philanthropy so deep in Sebastian S. Kresge that he left his foundation nine times the value of his personal estate. Our challenge grants have been meant to continue and to expand that example and vision of putting private resources to public good.

We have attempted to build on what was entrusted to us and to adapt it to current needs and opportunities. We have seen nonprofit organizations renew themselves and we have recognized that dynamic organizations are in need of renewal constantly. This is because they are the strange yet effective mixture of volunteers and staff, donors and paid employees, practitioners and clients, faculties and students, presenters and audiences, caregivers and patients that make up a vibrant, nonprofit sector. We know that this work never ends.

To have spent nearly two-thirds of my working life at The Kresge Foundation has truly been an honor and a pleasure.

Shortly before publication of this Annual Report, the Foundation received news of the death of William H. Baldwin who served sequentially as Trustee, President and Chair from May 1, 1963 until his retirement on September 21, 1985. All who served with him or visited him will remember his piercing questions, deep knowledge and biting but merry sense of humor. This outward demeanor was an attempt, not always successful, to conceal how trenchantly he cared for this Foundation and for those it served.

Two new Trustees were elected and welcomed in December, 2005. They are James L. Bildner of Manchester, MA and David W. Horvitz of Fort Lauderdale, FL.

Thanks go to two retiring Trustees, David K. Page, who served from February, 1992 until September, 2005 and Robert C. Larson who served from February, 1993 until June, 2006. John E. Marshall, III also retired in June, 2006, having served sequentially as Vice President, Executive Vice President and President/CEO beginning in August, 1979 and as Trustee beginning in February, 1991.

The Trustees and Staff welcome Rip Rapson, former President of The McKnight Foundation, as he joins The Kresge Foundation on July 1, 2006.

The Kresge Foundation is a national foundation founded in 1924 by Sebastian S. Kresge. It is one of the largest foundations in the United States with assets over \$3 billion. The Foundation believes that stronger nonprofits lead to stronger communities. Through all its grant programs, the Foundation seeks to strengthen nonprofit organizations by catalyzing their growth, connecting them to their stakeholders, and challenging greater support through grants. It strives to achieve these objectives through its core Capital Challenge Grant Program, Science Equipment Program and six special initiatives.

Several significant activities and events occurred in 2005 and early 2006. The Foundation's long-standing President and CEO, John E. Marshall, III, announced his retirement and his successor, Rip Rapson, was selected. Two special initiatives, the Partnership to Raise Community Capital and the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Initiative concluded, while an International Initiative was launched in South Africa and Mexico. The Foundation helped bring back classical music and jazz to audiences in southeastern Michigan through a Detroit Initiative grant to the Detroit Education Television Foundation. In 2005, the Foundation's Trustees also awarded extraordinary grants to support relief efforts following the natural disasters in the gulf coast of the US, Central America, South Asia, Somalia, and Sri Lanka. Finally, in early 2006, the Foundation moved back to its renovated and expanded headquarters facility.

It was also a record year with the second highest amount awarded in the Foundation's history. In total, 216 grants were authorized totaling \$131,770,027 to organizations in 37 states, Canada, United Kingdom, and South Africa. This represents a 10% increase in the dollar amount awarded, compared to 2004, and a 22% increase compared to 2003.

The Foundation's core grant making activities are in its **Capital Challenge Grant Program** with \$90,155,026 awarded to 131 nonprofit organizations in 2005 operating in the fields of education, health and long-term care, human services, arts and humanities, public affairs, and science, nature and the environment. Grant funds are directed toward the construction and renovation of facilities, purchase of equipment, and acquisition of real estate.

The Capital Challenge Grant recipients represent the diversity of the nonprofit field whether viewing them by type of organization, location, budget size, and/or populations served. However, they all shared a common goal as applicants: to strategically use the transformational event of a capital campaign to help strengthen and deepen their private donor base.

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The 2005 grant recipients had private campaign goals ranging from \$1 million to \$137 million and planned, in aggregate, to use the \$90 million in Kresge challenge grants to raise an additional \$567 million in private gifts toward their collective campaign goals.

In the **Science Equipment Program** (formerly referred to as the Science Initiative), the Trustees awarded seven grants totaling \$2,975,026 to five colleges and universities, a health care organization, and an environmental science research institution. Half of Kresge's grant supports the purchase of scientific equipment and the other half is awarded on a challenge basis to raise funds to endow an equipment repair and replacement fund. The Program was developed to provide institutions with immediate and on-going resources to equip their laboratories with current instrumentation and technology. This assists their efforts to recruit and retain students, faculty, and/or research scientists, and to provide quality academic or research programs. The equipment to be purchased by the seven grant recipients included a flow cytometer system and mass spectrometer for general science programs, CT scanning system for paleoclimate research, and brain imaging equipment for research on paralysis.

Since the Program began in 1988, the Foundation has awarded 145 grants totaling \$52.5 million. These grants have created endowment funds totaling \$163.8 million that will provide, when all pledges have been paid, approximately \$8.2 million income per year to repair, upgrade, and/or replace scientific equipment.

The Foundation completed two initiatives in 2005 and continues to operate four others.

The \$18 million **HBCU Initiative** concluded in 2005 and had been undertaken in cooperation with the Southern Education Foundation in Atlanta, GA. This five-year Initiative was designed to strengthen the advancement activities of historically Black colleges and universities with five institutions selected to receive an average of \$2 million in grants to hire staff, purchase technology and equipment, and participate in training opportunities. Significant on-site technical assistance was also provided by the Initiative's Program Director, Billie Sue Schulze. In addition, the Initiative offered an Annual Advancement Learning Initiative opened to all HBCUs.

The five participating institutions were Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, FL; Dillard University, New Orleans, LA; Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte, NC; Meharry College, Nashville, TN; and Xavier University, New Orleans, LA.

After five years, these institutions reported the following aggregate highlights:

- They had raised \$23 million more in FY 05 than before the Initiative began in FY 00;
- Alumni giving increased 48%, totaling nearly \$4.8 million;
- Trustee giving increased, with two exceeding \$1 million;
- More than 60 new fund raising positions were created, greatly increasing the number of trained and experienced fund raising professionals at HBCUs.

To share the valuable information gained through the Initiative about establishing and building an effective advancement program, Billie Sue Schulze wrote a "how-to" workbook titled, **Changing the Odds – Lessons Learned by the Kresge HBCU Initiative**, which is available on The Kresge Foundation's website, <a href="https://www.kresge.org">www.kresge.org</a>.

To build on the success of this Initiative, the Trustees of The Kresge Foundation approved a \$3 million grant in 2005 as part of a total \$8 million commitment to the United Negro College Fund to continue efforts to strengthen private giving at HBCUs. The Foundation's commitment specifically will implement the Institutional Advancement Program with selected HBCUs to receive grants for planning, staff, technology, and training.

In 2005, the Trustees added a Phase III to the **Partnership to Raise Community Capital** to further help the six participating community foundations strengthen giving for unrestricted endowment. The following five were awarded \$100,000 challenge grants to raise \$200,000 for unrestricted endowment: Community Foundation of Broward, Sioux Falls Area Community Foundation, Community Foundation of the Eastern Shore, Wyoming Community Foundation, and Saginaw Community Foundation. The Community Foundation of South Alabama was awarded a \$150,000 grant to raise \$300,000; the higher \$150,000 Kresge grant had an additional requirement that allowed only pledges from donors making their first gift to unrestricted endowment to be counted. Kresge grant dollars could be expended on technology, marketing, and/or unrestricted grant making programs. A total of \$1,481,047 was raised for unrestricted endowment by the six community foundations from 534 donors.

In Phase I, Kresge provided a \$1,000,000 grant to each community foundation to raise \$1,000,000 in unrestricted endowment funds and in Phase II, the Foundation awarded a \$2,000,000 grant to each to raise \$6,000,000 in agency-restricted endowment funds.

In the **Special Opportunities Initiative**, Kresge staff and consultants are working intensively with seven nonprofit organizations to help them establish or significantly expand their private base of support for annual operations. The Foundation wanted to extend the lessons learned in its HBCU Initiative beyond the higher education community and to gain additional knowledge about the best practices in effective advancement programs. Before the start of the Initiative, all seven had relied either on government funding and/or earned income to pay most of their expenses, which gave them little flexibility or sufficient resources to enhance their programs and services. Each institution developed four to five-year strategic plans with yearly quantitative (e.g., to raise a specific amount from individuals and/ or to raise a specific number of gifts at a certain level) and qualitative benchmarks (e.g., conduct board training sessions) with all organizations reaching their goals to date. This Initiative is closed and is no longer accepting new applications.

In 2005, the Trustees launched a five-year \$15 million **International Initiative** in Mexico and South Africa. Modeled after the Foundation's HBCU and Special Opportunities Initiatives, this effort seeks to also strengthen private giving in selected institutions through support for staff, training, and technology. This Initiative is also closed to new applications.

For the Mexico program, the Foundation awarded a grant of \$2,050,000 as part of a \$5 million commitment over five years to the YMCA of the USA, headquartered in Chicago, IL, to implement the Mexico Philanthropy Development Initiative involving the YMCA of Mexico. To help build private philanthropy in Mexico, Kresge funds will provide technical assistance, peer-to-peer training, salary support, and challenge grants to support capital and annual fund raising at the YMCA León, the Atizapán Community Development Center, the YMCA University's second campus, and the YMCA shelters for deported migrant youth on the US/Mexico border.

In South Africa, the Foundation is working with the South African Institute for Advancement (Inyathelo), based in Cape Town, to provide on-site support and training for four grantees: Cape Peninsula University of Technology; Children's Hospital Trust; University of Pretoria; and University of the Western Cape.

Grants totaling \$1,505,519 were awarded to these institutions. These grants represent the first in an expected series of annual operating and bonus grants totaling \$10 million over five years to the four grant recipients, pending each institution's successful completion of its yearly qualitative and quantitative benchmarks. The Initiative has a specific focus on building local giving, particularly from individuals, in order to strengthen private giving in and for South African nonprofit organizations. In addition to grant funds, the Initiative will provide grant recipients with training, mentoring opportunities, and exchange programs with peer institutions abroad.

The **Detroit Initiative** provides extraordinary grants to collaborative efforts that make Detroit a better place to live and work. In 2005, 8 grants were approved totaling \$19,000,000 including a \$2,500,000 grant to the Detroit Educational Television Foundation to bring back classical music and jazz to the region. The effort exemplifies collaboration with the radio station to be operated by the Detroit Education Television Foundation in studios owned by the Detroit School of the Arts and adjacent to Detroit Symphony Orchestra facilities. A Detroit Initiative grant was also awarded to the United Way for Southeastern Michigan to help establish a 2-1-1 call center, a 24/7 hotline providing a single access point for individuals seeking health and human services.

In 2002, the Trustees approved their largest Detroit Initiative commitment to the Detroit RiverFront Conservancy to support efforts to create public spaces along the Detroit River. The Conservancy continues to meet its financial and program benchmarks, which trigger Kresge grant awards. Toward the total \$50,000,000 commitment, the Foundation has awarded \$35,500,000 including \$10,000,000 in 2005.

The **Green Building Initiative** encourages nonprofit board and staff members to consider planning and designing a green building through grant support and educational materials. A green building is one that in its design, construction, and operation makes a minimal draw on non-renewable resources. To partially eliminate the financial barrier of higher "soft" costs associated with designing a green building, the Foundation provides planning grants between \$25,000 and \$100,000 to support fees, materials analysis, site considerations, and other expenses associated with implementing an integrated design approach. In 2005, 33 planning grants were awarded totaling \$1,969,000. Since the Initiative was launched in late 2003, 63 organizations have been awarded a total of \$4,083,000.

The other funding opportunity in this Initiative was the Bonus Grant program, which is now closed. These grants were awarded to recipients in the Foundation's Capital Challenge Grant Program that planned to have their projects certified through the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) program. In aggregate, 42 Bonus Grants have been committed totaling \$7,200,000 with two organizations each achieving their \$150,000 Bonus Grants in 2005.

This Initiative earned the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership Award in 2005 in the *Community* category. This award recognizes an individual or organization "making a significant contribution to enlarging and making more diverse and inclusive the community of practitioners and supporters advancing green building."

The Kresge Foundation returned to its renovated and expanded headquarters in early 2006. The Foundation developed green or environmentally sustainable facilities, which in their design, construction, and operation, reduce their draw on non-renewable resources The following highlights four of the facilities' key green features:

Building Orientation. The site plan for the new addition will produce the greatest energy savings for the Foundation. The addition is primarily two thin wings with the longest sides facing north and south. This orientation maximizes the sun from the north and south which provides the interior spaces with more natural interior lighting and creates less reliance on artificial light. One wing is also embedded in the earth, which provides natural insulation so that less energy is needed to heat and cool the building.

Stormwater Management. Most rainwater on the site drains to constructed wetlands and does not enter the City of Troy's stormwater system. The wetlands naturally filter impurities from the rainwater. When there is heavy rain, excess water is pumped from the wetlands to a cistern. Water collected in this cistern is then used to water the green roofs and provide recirculation for the wetlands as necessary.

Materials selection. The addition incorporates 27% recycled materials and 67% of all materials used came from within 500 miles, thus reducing use of energy for transportation. Wood flooring and desks are made from rapidly-renewable wheat board, finished with a veneer of FSC-certified wood. The Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) is a nonprofit organization that sets standards for forestry practices that are environmentally responsible, socially beneficial, and economically viable. The use of renewable and/or recycled materials is important because it creates less waste for our landfills. Walls are also painted with milk paint, made from milk protein and contain no volatile organic compounds (VOC) which produce toxic smells.

Geothermal System. A geothermal system uses the constant 55 degree temperature of the earth to help heat and cool the building. Water flows through the system's tubes in the ground and then returns to a heat pump which either releases the heat in the water in the winter or "reverses" the process in the summer to release the cool air into the building. It is anticipated that this system will use 20% less energy than a traditional system to heat and cool the facilities. Also, traditional systems rely on burning fuel (either on-site or at the power plant), which produce harmful emissions that degrade our air quality and contribute to acid rain.





#### Geographic Distribution of 2005 Grants



# **History and General Information**

## History of The Foundation

Sebastian Spering Kresge was born on July 31, 1867 in Pennsylvania. After graduating from school and teaching for a short period of time, S.S. Kresge decided to pursue a career in sales and retail. At the age of 30, he opened a "5 and 10 cent" store with John G. McCrory. This business evolved into a chain of stores which were incorporated as the S. S. Kresge Company in 1912, and later became known as Kmart.

He believed that giving back was a natural response to his success in business. In a letter dated May 1, 1924, S.S. Kresge wrote, "For a number of years I have been endeavoring to arrange my financial investments in order to set aside during my lifetime a considerable proportion of those investments for the use and benefit of those classes of individuals and organizations that have been and are deserving of public benefaction." With an initial gift of \$1.3 million, S.S. Kresge established The Kresge Foundation in 1924 "for the promotion of human progress by eleemosynary, philanthropic and charitable means..." S.S. Kresge's 1924 letter also noted, "No territorial limitation is placed on the field of operation of the fund."

The range of organizations supported by the Foundation remains as broad as outlined in S.S. Kresge's 1924 letter. He expressed interest in supporting "organizations whose object is to promote the well being of mankind..." A core grant program has evolved over time which focuses on opportunities to strengthen leadership and giving through challenge grants for capital projects. The challenge mechanism was introduced nearly from the start of the Foundation with a \$5,000 grant approved to a school for the deaf in 1929, contingent upon raising additional funds. The challenge concept became a more formal part of the Foundation's practice by the early 1960s.

The Foundation's 1956 Annual Report captures sentiment that is still true today: "Giving away money is not an easy job...Money alone cannot build character or transform evil into good; it cannot restore the influence and vitality of the home; neither can it maintain the valleys and plains of peace. Spent alone, it might as well stay in the vaults. It becomes palsied and impotent. It cries for full partnership with leaders of character and good will..."

S.S. Kresge made additional gifts over his lifetime to the Foundation and had contributed a total of \$60,577,183 at the time of his death at the age of 99. He gave away most of his fortune and left a personal estate that was less than one-tenth of the gifts he made to The Kresge Foundation.

The Kresge family has always been represented on the Foundation's Board. Sebastian Kresge was the Foundation's Treasurer until his death in 1966. His son, Stanley Sebastian Kresge joined the Board in 1930 and became its President in 1952, Chairman in 1966 and Honorary Chairman in 1978. He retired in 1985 and died that same year. Stanley Kresge's son, Bruce A. Kresge, joined the Board in 1966 and held a variety of leadership roles including Board Chairman from 2000-2003. He retired from the Board in 2003. Bruce Kresge's daughter, Deborah McDowell joined the Board in 1999 and retired in 2005. His other daughter, Katherine Lutey, joined the Board in 2003.

Since its first grant of \$100, the Foundation has awarded 9,559 grants for a total of \$2.28 billion.

## **Capital Challenge Grant Program**

Both your organization and project must be eligible to be considered for funding.

## Who may apply?

Nonprofit organizations with audited financial statements that have 501(c)(3) designations and are not classified as private foundations by the IRS are eligible to apply. Government and religious entities may apply. International organizations that would qualify as charitable organizations under United States law are also eligible.

Audits must be independently prepared following Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) or Government Auditing Standards (GAS). International applicants must have an independent audit prepared in accordance with their recognized local standards.

While an organization may have a separately incorporated, fund raising support organization that is conducting the campaign, the applicant to Kresge must be the organization that will hold title or a long-term lease to the asset (building, equipment, land, or easement) for which funding is requested.

#### Other eligibility policies:

- Colleges and universities must be fully accredited baccalaureate and/or graduate degree granting institutions.
- Seminaries must be fully accredited by the Association of Theological Schools.
- Elementary or secondary schools must predominately serve individuals with physical and/or developmental disabilities.
- Hospitals must be accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations.
- Organizations operated by or within religious institutions must serve secular needs, have space formally dedicated to their programs, and have financial and governing autonomy from the parent religious institution.

The Foundation makes grants with no geographic limitations and has no predetermined grant budget by category, geography, or type of project.

#### Who may not apply?

Community colleges, private foundations, and individuals are not eligible to apply. Elementary and secondary schools and religious organizations may not apply, except in the circumstances noted previously.

Nonprofit organizations without audited financial statements following GAAP or GAS are not eligible. Financial statements prepared on a cash, modified cash, compilation, or review basis do not qualify.

### What projects are eligible?

- Construction of facilities
- Renovation of facilities
- Purchase of major equipment or an integrated system at a cost of at least \$300,000; equipment costs may include computer software expenses, if applicable
- Purchase of real estate and conservation easements

#### What projects are ineligible?

The Kresge Foundation does not fund facilities to be used predominately for worship services, associate degree granting programs, or elementary and secondary schools (except as noted).

The Foundation does not make grants to support projects that are substantially completed at the time of application.

Kresge grant funds may not be applied toward retirement of long-term debt.

By themselves minor equipment, furnishings, operating/program support, and endowment funds are not eligible for Kresge funding. These needs, however, may be combined with an eligible component described above and submitted as part of a grant proposal. If a grant is approved, Kresge funds must be applied specifically toward the eligible portion of the project. Dollars raised as a result of the challenge grant may be used toward these elements.

#### Science Equipment Program

The Science Equipment Program awards challenge grants to upgrade and endow scientific equipment and laboratories in colleges and universities, teaching hospitals, medical schools, and research institutions. You may submit a Science Equipment application even if a proposal for the Foundation's Capital Challenge Grant Program is under consideration.

## **Green Building Initiative**

The Green Building Initiative is intended to increase the awareness of sustainable or green building practices among nonprofits and encourage them to consider building green. Upfront planning and an integrated design process are necessary to achieve the full benefits of a green building. The Initiative offers educational resources and special grants to help nonprofits during this planning phase.

The Initiative also offered a LEED Bonus Grant Program for grant recipients in the Capital Challenge Grant Program, but this Bonus program is now closed to new applications.





Notes to Financial Statements

#### 1. Investments

The Kresge Foundation (the "Foundation") reports marketable securities on the basis of quoted market values. The Foundation records its alternative investments based on industry standards and in accordance with Internal Revenue Service guidelines. Limited Partnerships which do not have readily determinable market values as of December 31, 2005 are valued based on available partner capital account balances as reported by the partnerships to the Foundation as of September 30, 2005 adjusted for capital contributions and distributions during the period from October 1, 2005 through December 31, 2005. Limited partnerships are valued in a consistent manner at December 31, 2005 and 2004. The partnership valuations involve assumptions and methods that are reviewed by the Foundation. Alternative investments are comprised of real estate, private equities, hedge funds, oil and gas and other types of limited partnerships. The hedge funds utilize leverage and invest in derivatives including futures, options and foreign currency forward contracts. The hedge funds also engage in the short selling of securities and derivatives. The real estate partnerships may utilize leverage.

Investment income and expenses are reported on the accrual basis and investment transactions are reported on a trade-date basis. Net realized gains (losses) and change in net unrealized market appreciation (depreciation) are determined by comparing cost to proceeds and fair market value, respectively. Cost is determined on a first-in first-out basis. Change in alternative investments is comprised of interest and dividend income, net realized gains (losses), net of partnership fees and expenses and the change in net unrealized market appreciation (depreciation).

At December 31, 2005, the Foundation had commitments to contribute approximately \$365,673,000 in additional capital under the terms of various agreements covering alternative partnership investments over the next ten years.

#### 2. Property and Equipment

Property and equipment represents primarily land and buildings. The property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets, which range from three to forty-five years. The associated accumulated depreciation was \$715,000 and \$699,000 at December 31, 2005 and 2004, respectively.

On December 11, 2002, the Board of Trustees approved the renovation and expansion of its Troy head-quarters. In 2005, \$8,500,000 of costs related to the planned construction were capitalized. Depreciation of the capitalized building cost will be calculated on the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the building, beginning on the date that the new facility is placed into service. At December 31, 2005, the Kresge Foundation had \$1,800,000 of commitments outstanding related to the planned construction of the building.

#### 3. Grants

Grants generally require matching funds to be raised before payment is made. It has been the Foundation's experience that substantially all grantees meet the matching requirement. Accordingly, grants are considered unconditional and recorded as expense in the year approved. Grants approved in 2005 and 2004 are net of cancellations of \$153,000 and \$915,000, respectively. Grants payable are reported at net settlement value which approximates present value. Grant payments in 2005 and 2004 were \$149,831,000 and \$97,715,000, respectively.

#### 4. Excise Tax Requirements

The Foundation is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"), but is subject to a 2% (1% if certain criteria are met) federal excise tax on net investment income, including realized gains, as defined in the Code. The current excise tax is provided at 1% for 2005 and 2004. The deferred excise tax provision is calculated assuming a 2% rate and is based on projected gains that assume complete liquidation of all assets. The current and deferred portions of the excise tax provision for 2005 were approximately \$3,871,000 and \$1,161,000, respectively and for 2004 were approximately \$2,013,000 and \$3,218,000, respectively. Excise tax payments in 2005 and 2004 were \$3,854,000 and \$1,850,000, respectively. The unrelated business income tax expense for 2005 and 2004 was \$2,883,000 and \$2,045,000, respectively.

## 5. Retiree Pension Plan and Post Retirement Employee Benefits

The Foundation sponsors a non-contributory qualified defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all current and former full-time employees along with an unfunded nonqualified plan for restoration of pension benefits lost due to statutory limitations imposed upon qualified plans. Net periodic pension expense was \$954,000 and \$1,127,000 for the years ended December 31, 2005 and 2004, respectively. The Foundation provides certain health care and life insurance benefits for retired employees. The Foundation's employees may become eligible for these post retirement employee benefits. Net periodic post retirement healthcare and life insurance benefit cost was \$676,000 and \$680,000 for the years ended December 31, 2005 and 2004, respectively.

The accumulated benefit obligation of the pension plan was \$10,295,000 and \$10,412,000 as of December 31, 2005 and 2004, respectively. The related market value of the plan assets was \$9,992,000 and \$9,313,000 at December 31, 2005 and 2004, respectively.

#### 6. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.
