

Celebrate Black History Month














Kresge's Arts & Culture Program curated a reading list that highlights the importance of human connections, rest and healing to drive change in communities.














Joyce M. Holliman's son-in-law reads to her grandson Nico. Joyce is also enjoying Madame C.J. Walker's "Gospel of Giving."





Michelle Perron is re-reading one of her favorite books of all-time!








