CREWS Grant Purpose

This project seeks to preserve the Graniteville Wetland and Forest, aka the Graniteville Swamp, through the court system. We seek to prevent the destruction of 1,800 mature trees and the destruction of the wetland's ability to absorb flood water by the development of a large strip mall. While we are in the courts, we have begun lobbying Governor Cuomo to buy the property outright and to turn it over to the State or City Parks system or to purchase it through eminent domain. By preserving this 30-acre tidal and freshwater, forested wetland, we aim to buffer the effects of climate change flooding and to lessen the effects of intense air pollution in this Environmental Justice community. The Coalition for Wetlands and Forests seeks to educate and empower those who will be most affected by climate change.

Our experiences are probably our biggest strength and now expertise. We have been fighting this fight for over three years. We started by organizing the community. going door to door handing out flyers, standing on street corners talking to people, having educational forums on the issues, visiting politicians looking for their support. We also went through the NYC Uniform Land Use Review Process (ULURP) which includes the Community Board, NY City Planning, the City Council and more. Since this is a racial justice, climate justice issue, we have joined other environmental justice groups. We started raising money by collecting donations on the street. Soon we graduated to fund raisers and now to grant writing.

We have been able to attract media attention.

We have visited schools and made presentations at large formal events.

We are willing and able to share what we have accomplished in the last three years.

Since 2006, GWNO has focused on neighborhood-based best management practices, or “BMPs”, implementing projects that mitigate storm water threats while improving quality of life, restoring ecosystems, and contributing to a healthier watershed that includes surrounding wetlands and the Gulf of Mexico estuaries. - Develop and manage green summer work opportunities and engagement for youth and returning citizens (formerly incarcerated); and
- Prioritize the most vulnerable areas of the community and spotlight voices of color.

Focused on water, land, air, health, and habitats in urban centers, the National Wildlife Federation urban initiatives and environmental justice conservation work is rooted in race and social justice by design. Johns Island residents have been collecting data on Johns Island for two years related to Fill and Build development practices and the consequent urban flooding and runoff. The runoff and flooding adversely affect Johns Island, both in the urban and rural areas, and the surrounding waterways. The Progressive Club proposes to continue and expand this work by continuing data collection, drawing more detailed conclusions, and presenting results in civic and political venues. They will affect ongoing development practices, the development of City ordinances, and decisions made at all levels of the development process.

GAVA is applying their community organizing methodology that, since 2012, has leveraged more than \$12 million in infrastructural and programmatic improvements for nutrition and physical activity, to begin to address flooding, heat, and other climate shocks and stressors, as well as displacement and economic justice issues. Southeast Austin is downstream and has endured a legacy of inequitable drainage investments and land use decisions, increasing the impact of intense flooding. With climate change intensifying rain patterns in Central Texas, low-income residents are at risk of severe financial devastation and disparate health impacts. Communities in this area led much of their own response and recovery efforts during catastrophic floods in 2013 and 2015, and have ample knowledge to teach neighbors as well as public and private agencies. Fostering transparency, community organizing, and civic engagement, GAVA and its partners seek to build their capacity to drive city-wide equitable policies and protocols that will protect people during and after future storms, and create initiatives to increase economic and climate resilience.

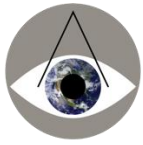

Climate Smart Cities partnerships and decision support tools were developed in Philadelphia, New Orleans, and Richmond (CA) through collaboration among government agencies and community organizations. The decision support tools are available at <https://web.tplgis.org/csc-project-gallery/> -- other tools include Boston and Los Angeles metro areas and Chattanooga, Cleveland, Camden, Dallas, Denver, Nashville, New York City and Providence. While each tool is unique, they enable analysis of community, equity, health and climate data to support green infrastructure investment to serve frontline communities. These platforms are expanding to include carbon capture potential, in addition to resilience needs in the community.
